INTRODUCTION BY FR PADRAIG WALSH PP.

The new year 2021 got off to a difficult start with the third lockdown. We all expected that the worst was over us in 2020 and that normality would resume once again. Sadly, our churches were closed for public worship for nineteen weeks until the re-opening for public Masses on Monday May 10th. During that time, funerals and weddings had very restricted numbers. Our First Holy Communion and Confirmation ceremonies didn't take place until the end of the summer. Even though the restrictions had eased from Easter onwards, it certainly took its toll on so many people in so many different ways. As we reflect back on Covid, it is hard to believe that we had Mass on-line for 44 Sundays over the three lockdowns. Who would ever have foreseen such a scenario?

As we had expected a return to normality this year since the end of February, we have been shocked by the war in Ukraine. Everyday on television, we have seen many horrific scenes of killing and destruction. Cities that have been completely destroyed beyond recognition. We have seen the human toll of this war - as women and children flee from their homeland, not knowing if they will ever see their husbands, brothers and fathers again. We have seen families leaving their homes with only the belongings they can carry. We continue to pray for peace in Ukraine and for the people who have been driven from their homeland.

We look forward to the ceremonies of Holy Week and to have congregations once again after two years on-line. As we prepare to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ this Easter, may the Risen Lord bless you with hope during the weeks and months ahead. On behalf of Fr Amos, Sr de Lourdes and myself, I wish you and yours, every blessing during this Easter season.

TOGETHER AGAIN SUNDAY

Parish life has been hugely affected during the three lockdowns. When we were allowed to re-open for public worship, only limited numbers were allowed to attend Masses and the different ceremonies in the churches. It was felt at diocesan level that we would need

to re-launch life in our parishes once again. With the easing of restrictions in the autumn, it was decided to designate Sunday October 31st as "Together Again Sunday". It was an opportunity to reflect on the period of covid with all its different aspects and to move ahead into a more hopeful chapter in our lives.





At the start of each of the Masses, we brought some symbols to the altar, to represent some aspects of life since the initial lockdown in March 2020.

Large Key brings us back to March 2020 when the whole country went into lockdown and the churches were closed. We were all living with a sense of fear and a sense of the unknown.

We were fortunate to be able to provide two extra vigil Masses on Christmas Eve and so many people were able to attend. Since then, the numbers attending Mass have been increasing steadily, and with the wearing of masks, it has been a safe environment for all who come to worship.

They will form our parish response to the Kerry Diocesan Synodal Team and to the Irish submission to the Synod.

PARISH ACCOUNTS 2021

Last year was another difficult year with the third lockdown and Mass was celebrated without congregations for 19 Sundays and 2 holydays (including St Patrick's Day). With the reduced numbers allowed to attend after the re-opening, it was obvious that there would be a significant shortfall in Parish income once again. The Development Fund collection held reasonably well and sincere thanks to all those who contributed so generously to the envelope collection during the year. The Offertory Collection took a severe hit for the second consecutive year, due to Masses without congregations, down €103,971 on 2019.

Given the lockdown last year until May, we were unable to have a Silver Circle and the Pastoral Centre income was reduced without groups using the facilities. Despite all the

difficulties, the surplus for 2021 is €55,424. Thankfully, we have been able to continue to provide an office back-up as well as being able to carry out any necessary maintenance.

Many of the special diocesan collections during the year did not take place except for the Sick and retired priests and a special Trocaire Appeal.

We appreciate the financial difficulties of many families due to Covid and we want to express our sincere thanks for your generous support of the Parish and Clergy Collections during the year.

PARISH COLLECTIONS AT SUNDAY MASS

1. Offertory Collection

The weekly offertory collection is taken up during weekend Masses. It is used for the day-to-day expenses of the parish. These include: staff wages, insurance, light & heat, routine maintenance, telephone and printing.

The total contribution to the Offertory Collection in 2021 was €54.329.

2. Envelope Collection (Capital Development Fund)

This collection is the weekly envelope collection. This fund is used to finance major works to parish property such as the repair of the stained glass windows. The total contribution in 2021 was €48,606. If you attend Mass in St John's Parish or in the Dominican Church, your envelopes are returned to our Parish.

We ask you to consider supporting it in one of the following four ways.

- **i. Weekly envelope collection.** If you not receiving a box of envelopes, please contact the Parish office.
- ii. Annual Cheque.

- **iii. Standing Order.** This is a convenient method for parishioners. If you would like to contribute to the Capital Development Fund by Standing Order, please contact the Parish Office.
- **iv. On-line donations** using the Donate button on the parish website.

3. Priests Income

The priests income comes from two sources:

Envelope Collections during the year.

- November Offerings
- Christmas Dues
- Easter Dues

Offerings given for:

Baptisms, Weddings, Funerals

The household expenses of the presbytery are paid by the priests.

Priests are considered to be self-employed by the Revenue Commissioners and pay their own income tax and PRSI directly each year. We would like to thank all who have contributed to the income of the priests. Your generous support is very much appreciated.

Tax Refund

The Revenue Commissioners have approved a scheme of tax relief for eligible charities. From 1st January 2013 all tax relief on contributions from parishioners over €250 regardless of their tax status i.e. (Self Assessed or PAYE) will now go to the Parish in all cases at a blended rate of 31%. These contributions need to be given in any of the envelope collections; the envelope collections for the priests and the Development Fund. If you have contributed more than €250, we will send you the relevant form to complete. In 2021, the amount received from the Revenue Commissioners was €29,715.
